### **Great Smoky Mountain National Park**

Marvin Ramsey introduced today's speaker, Tim Warner, who serves as the South District Tail supervisor at the Great Smokey mountain National Park in Cherokee, NC. Tim supervises trail maintenance crews, organizes projects, logging bridges and other trail issues. Prior to serving as supervisor in the Great Smokes, he has worked in some of the most breath taking parks here in the US. Tim has worked in Kings Canyon National Park in Southern California, Glacier National Park in Montana, Grand Teton National Park in Wyoming, Rocky Mountain National Park in Colorado and this past summer he completed a ninety day detail in the Shenandoah National Park in Virginia.





Tim indicated that his major in college was English so he joked

that it was a great lead into the national park service in 2000. He has a passion for trail work and believes it's a privilege to work for the park service. Marvin pointed out that between working in the forest and raising a family, Tim still finds time between thirty-minute power naps to go camping and serve as a deacon in his church.

His first job with the National Park Service at Kings Canyon and it was so remote that they would deliver him enough food for a week weekly. The camps are not fancy as he showed in his slide show. Tim indicated that he was lucky to be able to do the triple crown on national park trails: Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail on the West Coast, the Continental Di-

vide Trail and the Appalachian Trail. He has been with the Great Smokey National Park since 2010 where the park consists of over 500,000 acres and 460 miles of trails. In the Great Smokes are 60 trail bridges, 150 footslogs, 15 back country shelters, 89 back country camps and 3 back country bunk houses. Tim reported that there are 150 cemeteries in the GSMNP that were not disturbed when the park was developed.

Tim said that trail maintenance covers vegetation management such as removing downed trees, erosion control, as well as rehabilitation / construction trail work, storm damage response, hazard tree removal, carpentry and construction and showed slides of examples of before photos and photos of the rehabbed work. His team spent 3 years rehabbing Chimney Top Trail, rehabbed the Forney Ridge Trail and Alum Cave Trail. Since the trails are in remote areas there is a lot of logistics in getting the men and materials to the work areas and multiple skills required in completing the trail rehab work. Tim showed a slide of the Trails Forever 'Mobile' Trail shop. He said there is a team with the mobile trail shop working in the Virgin Island.

There is a Smokies Centennial Challenge 100 miles celebrating the National Parks Services 100th anniversary. If you walk the trail between Jan 1 and December 6th and complete one hundred miles , you will receive a commemorative pin. For additional information you can contact Tim at: tim\_warner@nps.gov
