MAINSPRING CONSERVATION TRUST

Stewards of the Southern Blue Ridge

Cindy Rogers introduced Jason Meador and our program about the Mainspring Conservation Trust. Jason serves as the Citizen Science Program Manager for the Trust and is responsible for engaging youth and adults in the community as to the work of Mainspring. He also serves as the Project Coordinator for stream restoration activities and the Biomonitoring Program. Jason received his B.S. in Marine Sciences from North Carolina State University (2004). He later completed his M.S. in Forestry and Natural Resources (2008) with a concentration in fish/wildlife populations.





The newly named Mainspring Conservation Trust is the metamorphosis of the Little Tennessee Land Trust (LTLT). Its scope has expanded to include the Upper Little Tennessee and Hiawassee River Valleys with three core objectives: conserve the land, restore the water, and connect the people to these valuable resources.

Jason was particularly proud of their "Shade your Stream" initiative. Streams that have become devoid of vegetation are vulnerable to erosion and increased water temperature. This condition creates a polluted and adverse environment for species of native fish such as trout that need cooler waters to thrive. Under this initiative, students helped to

"livestake" a section of Crawford Creek. Livestaking is a process of driving sections of tree branch that are self-rooting into the ground along the riparian area of a stream. The restoration of the shoreline of Crawford Creek as it runs through Franklin Memorial Park is a highly visible success story of reclaimed stream bank.

Also Jason oversees the "Kids in the Creek" program. This is a hands on program for 8-9th grade students that gets them out of the classroom and into waders to examine the health of the stream. Students along with science teachers and Conservation Trust staff drop a type of seining net into the stream to collect, identify and study native fish and other marine life. Jason hopes that the experience might inspire a young person to pursue a career in bio - marine science or conservation. But at the very least, hopefully the experience will instill an appreciation of the streams and rivers that are so important to our quality of life in Western North Carolina.
