Rich Peoples spoke on business ethics indicating that RI has the tools for business ethics. The three tools that RI provides Rotarians to implement the best practices of business ethics in their profession are: The Object of Rotary, Four Way Test and Code of Conduct.


The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise. In particular to



encourage and foster the development of acquaintance as an opportunity of service; promote high ethical standards in business and professions; apply the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business and community life; and the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

The Four Way Test is the standard against which Rotarians measure ethical behavior. We reinforce the tenets of the Four Way Test at each of our meetings. Our club has taken this important concept on ethics of what we think, say or do to teach the middle school students here in Franklin so that they can start incorporating these concepts into their personal lives.

Rotarian Code of Conduct requires us to act with integrity and high ethical standards in our personal and professional life. We Rotarians are committed to ethical behavior. We are required to deal fairly with others and treat them and teir occupation with respect. Rotarians have a responsibility to teach young people and to be a benefit to society.mRotarians are to avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians. When we became Rotarians we became a part of a family of like-minded people around the world.

Alzheimer's currently affects more than six million Americans and more than forty-seven million people worldwide. Show host Carl White says, "The journey in developing this story is very emotional and rewarding at the same time. We've learned a lot and met many wonderful people who have dedicated their life to this cause. And the fact that it all started here in the Carolinas, is good reason for us all to be very proud."
