Smoky Mountain Pregnancy Care Center

Tammy Farrell introduced Jenny Golding, CEO of the Smoky Mountain Pregnancy Care Center (SMPCC). SMPCC has two locations, one in Franklin and one in Cullowhee. It started in 2001 in Franklin and it is a non-profit Christian organization that serves Macon, Jackson and other adjoining counties. Golding described SMPCC as a Pro-Life and Pro-Love organization. They provide help and guidance to females who are pregnant or who believe they may be pregnant. Their mission is to explain the options available to pregnant women. Many females believe that abortion is their only option. SMPCC discusses other options, including adoption. Golding stated that when their


clients actually see their babies in the womb via an ultrasound machine it can be a life- changing experience.

These two centers have served 10,500 clients since they opened in 2001. Last year they performed 240 ultrasounds. And recently they were able to purchase 2 new ultrasound machines, thanks to the Knights of Columbus and other local community groups. The Cullowhee center is located near Western Carolina University(WCU) and provides assistance to the many college-age female students there. The highest number of abortions occur in this age group. Golding explained that there have been instances



whereby female college athletes have struggled with the fear of losing their scholarships due to pregnancy and SMPCC has been instrumental in helping these athletes maintain their scholarships thru deferment.

Golding noted that the services they provide are free to their clients, who otherwise would have to pay over \$900.00 for such services. SMPCC also maintains an Adoption Referral List and helps it's clients who have chosen this route in deciding whether to have an open or closed adoption proceeding. Golding closed by saying that SMPCC has saved many lives. It would not have been able to do so without the support and financial help from the community. Their website is at www.smpcc.org.
