Children's Hope Alliance and Rotary Partnering to Change Young Lives

Katie Henry, Development Coordinator for Children's Hope Alliance (formerly Barium Springs), shared an exciting initiative undertaken between her agency and the Rotary clubs of Western North Carolina. Children's Hope Alliance is embarking on their third capital funds campaign with a specific goal this year. They are trying to raise sufficient money make the transition from their existing emergency teen shelter, Hawthorne Heights, into a much larger and better facility located in Bryson City. Katie, a Sylva Club Rotarian and John Short, our Charita-




ble Foundation Chairperson, along with Gary Dills and Tom Coley have formed a task force to present this need to the eleven WNC Rotary clubs in the geographic area directly served by the shelter.

These clubs are invited to join Franklin Rotary's contribution of \$2000 in an effort create a \$10,000 challenge fund that will be announced at the fund raiser breakfast on April 23rd at 8:30 a.m. at the Burrell Conference Center in Sylva. The task force to date has made a slide presentation to five clubs and estimates that we are about halfway to the \$10,000 goal. If we can attain this goal, there is an opportunity to have a high traffic area in the new shelter, such as a recreation room or dinning room named as "The Rotary Room". The thinking would be to have a plaque with all of the contributing Rotary clubs listed and a framed copy of The Four Way Test prominently displayed. Hopefully, a lasting impression would be made on the youth even after their stay at the shelter as they learn about the code a Rotarian lives by and knowing that we care about them.

These youth come to the shelter under great family stress, emotional trauma, and even physical and sexual abuse. One of our primary goals of the Charitable Foundation is to raise funds for charities that provide support for early intervention to youth at risk. The Children's Hope Alliance tries to stabilize a youth and their family situation in a positive way and put them on a path to recovery and responsible citizenship.

Katie sincerely thanked Franklin Rotary for the commitment made thus far and invited all members and anyone else that has an interest in helping these at risk youth to the "Giving Them Hope Breakfast". It cost you nothing to attend and you will hear heartwarming stories of successful teens whose lives have been changed for the better. You may rsvp at the number below or contact any of the task force team, John, Gary, or Tom. We expect to have three or more "Rotary Tables" made up of Rotarians from the WNC community. We hope to see you there. Together we can make a difference.



District Assembly 5/16






