

Blue Ridge Free Dental Clinic

Jack Horton introduced Howard Meister, President of the board for Blue Ridge Free Dental Clinic and Don Freeman, the secretary. Jack explained that a coalition of churches fro Cashiers area sponsored a 3-day free dental clinic for the poor in the Cashiers area. At the end of the three days a number of people in need of dental care were turned away. This sparked the idea of starting a free dental clinic for the poor in the region. The Clinic is celebrating its 10th anniversary in 2015.



Howard stated that the original clinic in 2005 had three operatories and after an expansion project in 2013 they now have six in a 3.000 square foot facility. They have 14 volunteer dentist who in 2014 donated over 1250 hours providing free

statement is: "Saving Lives, One Tooth at a Time."


Part of their program to increase awareness of the Clinic in the region is their Tooth Fairy brigade. The Tooth Fairies in full costume present programs to school children, march in parades and other public events in the area. In partnership with the Sylva Rotary Club the Clinic goes to schools in Jackson County to promote proper teeth brushing and flossing methods in a fun way. Howard and Don asked the Franklin Rotary Club to think about doing a similar partnership for children's dental heath education in Macon County Schools. Setting up proper teeth brushing and flossing methods will go a long way to improving dental hygiene and start the decline of generational cycle of poor dental hygiene in our three County area.

Howard outlined what monetary gifts to the Clinic would provide in dental services. For example: a \$10 gift would cover a single child exam and x-rays with \$15 doing the same for an adult; a \$25 gift covers a child cleaning; \$50 covers one surface filling; \$75 covers a surgical extraction of a tooth; a\$150 gift covers a anterior root canal with a \$200 gift covers a crown or posterior root canal. Those gifts for the different dental procedures are approximately one-fourth of the cost at a regional dentist office. Howard indicated the level of poverty in the three County area is such that the clinic keeps seeing an increased number of patients each year in their state of the art dental clinic.
