Many of us often don't understand how difficult it can be for some people to make ends meet. Manna Food bank is an organization that has been in existence for over 30 years with one main goal in mind—- involving, educating, and uniting people to stop hunger.


Ella Kliger, Western Outreach Coordinator spoke to members of the Rotary Club of Franklin on what her organization does and how it adapts to the ever changing times that many face economically. One way Manna cope is by partnering with the Department of Social Services on a low energy assistance program. One of the biggest issues Manna experiences today is the elderly not being able to pay their expenses. Manna also works with Carenet in giving out boxes of food once a month to those in need.

Kliger told members that times have changed where the "food stamp" has been replaced by a debit card allowing the individual to complete their assistance transaction with ease. However 30 percent of those who do not

have enough food don't realize they qualify for food assistance. Kliger also finds that many are not willing to go to a government office somewhere for assistance. Manna services communities by going to the individuals.

Last year Manna gave out over 100 thousand pounds of food across 16 counties in Western North Carolina from Avery to the Tennessee border counties. Manna is funded by individual donations, estates, grants, and a smaller portion of federal funding. They belong to the Feeding America Network. Manna asks those agencies that they give food to, to pay a handling fee that offset some fuel costs to deliver goods. Manna depends on a large number of individuals who volunteer their time. 




# 50/50 INFORMATION CARDS 13 — POT IS \$14





St Valentine's Day (A history, maybe?)

St Valentine's Day may have begun as a liturgical celebration of one or more early Christian Saints named Valentinus. The most popular martyrology associated with Saint Valentine was that he was imprisoned for performing weddings for soldiers who were forbidden o marry and for ministering to Christians who were persecuted under the Roman Empire. During his imprisonment, he is said to have healed the daughter of the jailer Asterius. Legend tells us that before his execution, he wrote a note for her and closed with "from your Valentine". Today, Saint Valentine's Day is an official feast day in the Anglican Communion, as well as in the Lutheran

Church. The Eastern Orthodox Church also celebrates Saint Valentine's Day, albeit on 6 July and 30 July, the former date in honor of the Roman presbyter Saint Valentine and the latter date in honor of Hiermartyr Valentine, the Bishop of Interamna (modern Terni).

The day was first associated with romantic love in the circle of Geoffrey Chaucer in the High Middle Ages, when the tradition of courtly love flourished. By the 15th century, it had evolved into an occasion in which lovers expressed their love for each other by presenting flowers, offering confectionery, and sending greeting cards known as valentines. And I thought Hallmark invented Valentine's day!!!
