

HOSPICE HOUSE FOUNDATION OF WNC

Banks Hinshaw, board member for Hospice House Foundation of WNC was introduced as today's speaker at the Rotary Club of Franklin by Rotarian John Barbee. Banks and his wife reside in Franklin where they both practice medicine.

Banks gave the club an update on the progress of the future Hospice House which will be located on the Dryman property on Maple Street. The project started back in 2007 when they received their certificate of need from the state for a 6 apartment facility. The total cost of renovating the facility will be \$4.9 million dollars. They need \$4 million in hand to start the construction of which \$3.2 million has been raised. That leaves \$800,000 left to be raised before construction can start. The State Employees Credit Union has donated \$1 million to the project. Monies are being raised through interested parties, grants, churches, bequests and local fundraising

Hospice homes are a refuge for those terminal ill patients who have no home to go too. The patient usually has only 6 months left to live. At the hospice house the patient can receive medicine and care to make their quality of life better.

Their mission statement is to create and maintain an independent non-profit facility for a compassionate team providing medical, emotional and spiritual help.

A patient decides to seek hospice care when they have no desire to seek further medical treatment. Hospice care can be either at home or at a hospice house. It was noted that hospice is as much for the family as it is for the patient.

The hospice house will have a hospice physician, specialty nurse, nurse assistants and a music therapist on staff.

The home will provide needed services for the 6 western counties as well as 4 neighboring counties in Georgia. By 2020, of these mentioned counties, 28% of their population will be 65 and older compared to the national average of 17%. This will be a much needed facility for our community.
