Tom James introduced Ric Hunter who gave a firsthand eyewitness account of the S.S. Mayaguez, Last Battle of Vietnam. Ric, a retired Colonel, served 27 years as a combat veteran in the U.S. Air Force. He has over 4,000 flight hours in high performance aircraft, including the F-4 phantom and F-15C Eagle. He was an Eagle squadron commander and three time Top Gun.

Upon retiring Ric became a freelance writer/photographer for magazine feature articles in aviation, fishing and hunting magazines. After the attacks on 9-11-01 he returned to serve his country as a civil servant for eight years. He took over the world-wide program management of the Air Force's

50 million dollar fighter aircraft flight simulator program.

Ric recently completed his first book "Firehammer", a historical fiction novel based on a true story that puts the reader in the cockpit of an F-4 during the evacuation of Saigon and then the last battle of the Vietnam War and the rescue of the S.S. Mayaguez crew.

Ric currently lives in Burnsville, N.C. His daughter is currently in the U.S. Air Force and is the third generation to serve their country.



Ric gave us an overview of the responsibilities of an F-4 fighter pilot and a look at the weaponry systems. A way of recognizing an F-4 is its rounded up wing tips. Every mission starts with a mission briefing followed by a walk around of the plane ensuring there are no visible problems. The plane was equipped with a Gatling gun, capable of firing 6,000 rounds per minute, and ground missiles. The pilot sat in the front seat and the weapons system officer in the back. Each had specific duties while in flight. The plane carried 15,000 pounds of fuel and upon take-off the two engines developed 16,000 pounds of thrust.

The Last Battle of Vietnam happened in the Gulf of Thailand just off the Cambodia coastline. The battle itself lasted four days in which 41 lives were lost. The mission was to rescue the crew of the S.S. Mayaguez which had been captured by the Vietnamese. The first day Ric and the other pilots were to fly over and gather information on the situation. The second day a fishing boat had been spotted and Ric was ordered to destroy it. As he approached the boat his weapons systems froze up and would not function, which ultimately saved American lives. As he passed over the boat he realized the American crew was on board the boat and the mission was aborted. The following day Ric's mission was to take out the Kymer Rouge which allowed all the marines to be rescued but three.

Ric said three things were accomplished following that battle: 1) the crew was rescued 2) no ships were taken after that point and 3) the U.S. regained world credibility. For more information on Ric and his latest novel go to www.firehammernovel.com or email at firehammernovel@aol.com

ship that is dispersed at \$3000 per year.














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Greenway Clean-up

DGND Gary Dills attended from our club along with various other leaders from our district as well as other districts in the zone which stretches all the way to Delaware.








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




Murphy's Law of Lockers - If there are only 2 people in a locker room, they will have adjacent lockers.
