



First place went to "Beermeister" - aka Lenny Jordan


Second Place went to "Electron Guy" - aka Larry Hollifield Third Place went to "Golf God" - aka Fred Drexler

Nancie's Notes



Sgt. Bill's "EDUCATION IN MACON COUNTY"

After the early settlers moved to Macon County, cleared their land and built a house, their next priorities were a church and school to educate their children. Often one building served both purposes. Many of the earliest settlers living in very remote areas, hired a teacher to come and live with the family to teach the children. Part of a teacher's pay was his or her room and board.

Our first knowledge of provision for public schooling in Macon County.

Our first knowledge of provision for public schooling in Macon County came from a ruling of the county commissioners that on May 20, 1835, 357 acres in the town of Franklin would be offered for sale. This land was to be sold for \$3 per acre and the profits to be used for construction of a male and female academy. By 1840the first private school was in operation near Franklin. On January21, 1840 the Macon County court levied a county-wide school tax of \$520—this being the first record found of such a tax. The male academy was opened in 1849 and the female academy was established in 1854. Each of these schools had one teacher who taught all subjects. Some of these subjects were Greek, astronomy, mythology, logic philosophy and four years of Latin.


In 1903 Macon County passed the first compulsory attendance law in the state. Parents were required to see that their children attended school until the age of 14. Buncombe and other counties were interested to see how much this would affect attendance and in 1904 The Asheville Citizen reported that attendance wa up 34%. Other counties in the state soon followed with attendance laws. Priority of quality education continues through today.

We are coming down to the end of this Rotary year. We've accomplished a lot this year, and have also had the honor of having another one of our members, Gary Dills, elected as the incoming District Governor Nominee. Gary Bray, also a member of our Club, will be installed as District Governor at the District Conference in Greenville, SC the weekend of June 22nd. 


Clayton's Corner New Vocab Words Pt.2


THE GOLF CLUB at MILL CREEK Franklin, NC


