NC Superintendent of Schools—Mark Johnson

Superintendent of Public Instruction State of North Carolina, Mark Johnson, spoke at our club this week. Personally, it was very refreshing to hear the direction our NC Education system is heading. Mark John began his education career in West Charlotte with Teach for America between 2006 & 2008. This area is very economically depressed and it was hard to be a teacher and even harder to be a student. This experience lead Johnson to feel a sense of anger towards an education system that can let children slip through the cracks!

Johnson did an excellent job illuminating the direction our education system is taking. Our current system of one teacher teaching a standard curriculum tailored for students to pass a standard End of Year test leaves some students either behind, or bored. Through Johnson's young vision, he hopes that the education system will rely on technology to cater to an individual student's pace. For instance, the class can all be focused on the same "lesson" and progress either quickly or have individual attention from the teacher if they are facing a difficulty in understanding the topic at hand.

NC READS is our North Carolina state wide reading initiative. This initiative focuses on building a literacy support network for parents. A parent can click on their county to be immediately connected to literacy support in their area. Johnson stated that 15-20 minutes a day of reading to your child can put them on track to complete literacy by the third grade. NC has also invested in \$200 of supplies per classroom in each NC classroom for literacy supplies.

The biggest announcement that Superintendent Johnson unveiled was that students do not need to go to a four year college to see success. One of the reasons for this movement is the lack of skilled tradesman in the market. Also, our country is trying to head off the impending student debt crisis that has the potential to create another, larger recession than 2008. Johnson said they are trying to negate the stigma that is associated with trade positions by incorporating more collaboration with tech-colleges, trade programs in high schools, and trade tracks.

Mark Johnson did a fabulous job highlighting the educational future for our youth. Thank you Chris Baldwin for getting Superintendent Johnson to our club, it was truly wonderful to have him with us!
