tent of giving back to the community that has so openly welcomed her.






New member David Notestine was born in Houston, Texas and lived there for his first forty years. He and

(If you are on Patton Road and reach Whistle Stop Way you've gone too far.) 1145 Patton Road is on the right just past Oak Hill Drive. (If you reach Dobson Road you've gone a little too far.)



1896 Henry Ford makes a successful nighttime test drive of his first horseless carriage, called a Quardricycle, in the streets of Detroit.


1927 At Worchester, Massachusetts, the United States beats Britain to win golf's first Ryder Cup.


